Suggestions from the 2016 Muse Contest judge, Dennis Herschbach, regarding poetry, and specifically "those writers whose poems didn't make it into the winner's circle":

Refrain from using inversions in your writing. They make the poem appear to come from past eras. Watch for archaic words that are no longer commonly used. Make sure your line-breaks are placed for a reason, not simply to keep each line equal to the others. Each line should end with a strong word, not a conjunction, article or preposition. The title of a poem is important. Don't repeat it in the first line of your poem, and make sure it lends itself to the reader's understanding of the poem. Several poems used repetition to distraction. Use repetition gently, not as a club. These are only a few of the criteria I used in my judging.

DEADLINE: July 30. The Woodrow Hall Top Shelf Awards 2016 are intended to acknowledge and celebrate poems that have earned an audience through prior publication. 2018 Wisconsin Poets Calendar Call For Submissions

Submissions are open **July 1–December 1, 2016**. Poems arriving prior to July 1 will be deleted. Poems arriving after 11:59 PM on December 1 will not be considered.

Tried and true advice from the past still applies: shorter poems have a better chance of getting in. We want to include as many poems as possible. There will be a strict 30-line limit, including stanza breaks. Lines longer than 60 characters count as 2 lines.

Seasonal works have a slight advantage; accessible poems as well: remember, the audience is not just other poets but the general public. That said, we have no specific theme but encourage you to send "your best stuff."

Submissions are open to all with a Wisconsin connection, but strong preference will be given to those who are year-round (or almost year-round) residents.

Send no more than three poems; previously published is OK, but credit first publisher and include year of publication.

- 1. Contestant must be a current WFOP member.
- 2. No entry fee. Do not send SASE. Entries will not be returned.
- 3. Completed entry form must be included with submission. Contest opens on June 1. Entries must be postmarked by September 1. Use a business envelope for last-minute entries; large envelopes often do not arrive until after the packets have been sent to judges.
- 4. Contestant may enter only one original, unpublished poem in each category. The same poem may not be entered in more than one category. Categories are described on the Entry Form. *Please note the eligibility rules for the Kay Saunders Memorial Emerging Poet category*.
- 5. Manuscript must be typed on 8½"x11" white paper, one side only, one poem to a page. Type the category in the upper left corner.
- 6. Writer's name should **NOT** appear on the page with the poem.
- 7. Only the winners will be notified prior to the Fall Conference where the presentations will be made. The names will be posted on the WFOP website and included in the *Museletter* following the conference.
- 8. The First Place winner in each category will be ineligible to enter that category the following year.
- 9. Prizes will be awarded only if there are sufficient entries and the contest judge determines that an entry warrants an award.
- 10. Sorry, but WFOP cannot accept responsibility for lost manuscripts and there will be no notification if an entry is disqualified for failure to follow the rules. Author retains all rights to her/his work.

WISCONSIN POETRY RECITATION CHALLENGE

Wisconsin Poet Laureate Kim Blaeser invites you to join a project celebrating the art of poetry recitation. Those who participate will have their video recitations available online—and will help make Wisconsin the Poetry Recitation Capital of the U.S.!

To celebrate poetry and "heart," Blaeser invites memorization and recitation of poems for this special project. "Having poetry at our fingertips—or on our lips—as we go through our daily lives can enrich us in many ways," she says. "Recitation was once a common art I'd like to revive. When we know poems 'by heart,' they inhabit us and we them in a particular way. We internalize the images, the ideas, and the poem's re-seeing of the world, we experience the felt rhythm of the language. The poem becomes another part of the vocabulary with which to encounter and process experiences in the world, a tool of celebration and of survival. Each poem we memorize adds to our intangible wealth."

To participate, select a published poem by a poet you love and learn it "by heart," then submit a video of yourself reciting the poem from memory. Participants are asked to introduce themselves by name on the video as well as introduce the poem with a sentence or two including the name of the poem and the poet. The performer may also note why the poem or poet is important to them, when they memorized the poem, or whatever else seems appropriate to a very brief introduction. Send video to wipoetlaureate@gmail.com with the subject line

"Submission Recitation Project" followed by the reciter's name (e.g.: Submission Recitation Project, Kimberly Blaeser). In the e-mail, include the name of the reciter, the title and author of the poem performed, and the location and date of the recitation. By submitting the video, an individual givespermission to the Wisconsin Poet Laureate Commission to post their video and make it available for public viewing. (Participants under eighteen years of age must provide the e-mail address of a parent or guardian who can provide permission to post the video.)

To make this more interesting, Blaeser suggests you challenge friends and public figures to recite, or plan a gathering with a group in a public place and hold a recitation event. Then submit the videos of individual recitations from your "poetry by heart" celebration. Blaeser and members of the Wisconsin Poet Laureate Commission are also working to plan recitation events, and she is willing to travel to events others plan.

Video submissions will be considered by an editorial committee and will continue to be reviewed on a rolling basis. All acceptable submissions will be posted on an interactive map of Wisconsin and posted at wisconsinpoetlaureate.org/

The Commission has received several terrific submissions. Some were collected at the Woodland Pattern Poetry Marathon and from a special recitation event held at UW-Marathon County in Wausau. Blaeser will announce the launching of the map at facebook.com/WisPoLo/ as soon as the project goes live.
