I'm not much of a "Zoomer," so I miss out on many virtual events. Because of this, I value any chance to hook up with other poets through online sites or print publications.

One of my favorite morning routines is to visit *Your Daily Poem* (yourdailypoem.com) and take a few minutes to read the poem for the day. (Actually the poem is waiting for me as soon as I turn on my phone or desktop.) A few minutes often becomes more as I click on the covers of the featured poets' books to learn more about them and their work. I am often delighted to see a WFOP member's poem featured. Now Jayne Jaudon Ferrer, the site's founder and administrator for twelve years, has compiled "100 poems selected out of the nearly 4000 archived on YDP for their ability to make you smile." The exciting news is 13 poets from Wisconsin (most of them members of WFOP) are included, second only to California which has 14! The book is called Poems to Lift You Up and Make You Smile and is available through Parsonsporch.com. Watch for announcements of upcoming readings around the state in the weekly events mailing and both WFOP Facebook pages.

WFOP's own stellar publication *Bramble* is now open for submissions. Check out the theme and guidelines on wfop.org to see what guest editors Gillian Nevers, Keesia Hyzer and Nancy Jesse are looking for. Also watch for the publication of the 2022 Wisconsin Poets' Calendar, edited by Jane Osypowski and Suzy Wedeward. The advance proofs are lovely.

Speaking of the *Calendar*, we still need someone to manage distribution and promotion. This job has defaulted to me, a 72-year-old woman who needs a wrist brace to type and a back brace to lift and drive. I could obviously use some help. 2023 Wisconsin Poet's Calendar

Heads up: the Wisconsin Fellowship of Poets will begin accepting poems for the 2023 Wisconsin Poets' Calendar beginning November 1, 2021.

The theme for this year's *Calendar* is "Mythos of Wisconsin". A mythos is a traditional or current theme, or a set of beliefs. A mythos can be a myth, of course, but it can also be a person or a landscape or even an historical moment that illuminates what Wisconsin is all about. The basic idea is that a mythos underlies the lives we, as poets, mythmakers and storytellers, are living now. It explores how our Wisconsin lives have come to be how they are.

Poets must be at least 18. a resident of Wisconsin or have a close connection to Wisconsin. Submission guidelines will appear on wfop.org in late October. Submissions received prior to November 1 will be returned. Deadline is February 1, 2022.

Editors for this year's calendar are Thomas Davis, Ethel Mortenson Davis, and Mike Orlock. Thomas Davis is the author of three books of poetry, five novels, and one nonfiction volume. Ethel Mortenson Davis is an artist and the author of six books of poetry. Mike Orlock is the current Poet Laureate of Door County and author of four books of poetry.



JACKSON: A GRANDMOTHER'S SUPER HERO

Standing with sheaves of strength, his legs anchored to the batter's box, eyes the color of rainclouds, he patiently awaits the pitch.

Covid-19 memories and fears fly away faster than the ball heading his way.

His eight-year-old consciousness tosses the rigors of virtual learning into the catcher's mitt of educational success.
