Carol Lee Saffioti-Hughes' poem "Dark Eyes" was included in "Artery" at Spectrum School of Arts and Gallery in Racine, a joint show featuring poets and artists. Her poem "Wind Eye," was published and translated into Chinese in *Poetry Hall* 10.

In Memoriam

Josephine "Josie" Zell, longtime member of WFOP, passed away on November 16, 2020, in Madison. Josie actively served the WFOP as Regional Vice-President, Executive Vice-President and co-editor of the 2007 Wisconsin Poets' Calendar. Many in the WFOP will remember Josie as a welcoming and encouraging presence to new members and fledgling poets.

Josie was born on April 26, 1934, in Oswaldtwistle, Lancashire, England. After emigration to the United States, she taught at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee and later in the Madison Public Schools, where she encouraged her students and colleagues to read and write poetry. Josie held degrees from the University of Manchester, England, and UW–Madison. She is survived by a son and daughter and eight grandchildren.

A Busker's Lament

In the abracadabra line of work there are a number of drawbacks and very few rewards—or awards for that matter. Too often I've heard someone make a dismissive crack about sidewalk illusionists. These barbs are the dark underbelly of the trade. Unlike a mime, a magician gets no respect—nor tips in the top hat strategically placed upside down.
