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Co-Presidents' Message

Greetings! There is much news to share—a successful conference in Wausau featuring excellent poetry and time for fellowship, passage of our amended Constitution and Bylaws and Mission in Action statement (at the Business Meeting and by email). Minutes and the amended Constitution and Bylaws are available on our website.

Looking ahead there is also much to do. After scarcely a year in office, we are learning that you want us to try new ideas. Early in 2023, the Board will begin a strategic planning process to discuss several questions—should we organize, as we traditionally have, two conferences a year or just one? Should we offer more regional meetings? What about more online poetry workshops? Additional publications? We've appreciated your feedback.

Two exciting developments:

- 1) A new partnership to hold a chapbook publication contest with **Brain Mill Press**. This contest will be open to all Wisconsin poets, with a particular interest in voices underrepresented in traditional publishing. This partnership aligns with WFOP's mission to broaden its reach, building new audiences through chapbook workshops and Brain Mill Press's mission and reputation. Details to come.
- 2) A significant donation from Lifetime member and former VP Richard Swanson and his wife Fanny: \$16,000, \$4,000 per year for the next four years! We'll be getting a small group together to work with Richard and Fanny on how to allocate this extremely generous gift, with a special interest in support of emerging poets.

As we move forward, we continue to face the challenge of not enough volunteers. Most especially needed is a *Wisconsin Poets' Calendar* Business Manager. Gillian Nevers and Steve Tomasko have offered to help with two aspects of this role for the 2024 *Calendar*, but we are still in need of someone to contact bookstores and coordinate with the printer. Beyond 2024, the *Calendar* may have to be put on hold until we can find volunteers to complete this critical work.

- 1. Contestant must be a Wisconsin resident 18 years of age or older.
- 2. Only one original unpublished poem not under consideration elsewhere may be entered in the WFOP Muse contest. "Published" includes any print or electronic presentation except copies of drafts shared with critique groups. Seventy-five line maximum.
- 3. Prizes are: 1st place \$200.00, 2nd \$100.00, 3rd \$75.00.
- 4. Contest opens on November 1, 2022. The deadline is February 1, 2023.
- 5. Send the submission in the body of a single email to 2023WFOPmusecontest@gmail.com. The subject line should read: "Muse Contest Entry from (Last name, First name)." Attachments will not be opened. The body of your email should include your name, address, email address, phone number, poem title and confirmation of payment of entry fee (see #7, below).
- 6. Snail mail entries will be accepted from people who have no access to email. Deadline for receipt of snail mail submissions is January 25, 2023 because the poems will have to be retyped into the email file going to the judges. PLEASE DO NOT SNAIL MAIL IF YOU HAVE EMAIL! Mailing address: Mary Rowin, 7426 Voss Pkwy, Middleton, WI 53562. Include your name, address, phone number, poem title and whether you are willing to have your poem published in the WFOP Museletter if it wins a prize on a separate page. Include confirmation of payment of entry fee or a check (see #7, below). Do not send a SASE. Entries will not be returned.
- 7. There is an entry fee of \$4.00 for WFOP members and \$8.00 for non-members. The payment may be made at wfop.org/annual-contests. Include confirmation of payment in the email with the poem. Paper checks may be made out to WFOP Literary Fund and mailed to: 2023 WFOP Muse/Rowin, 7426 Voss Pkwy, Middleton, WI 53562. Payment will be matched to submissions. Submissions without payment will not be judged.
- 8. You will receive a return email acknowledging that your poems have arrived. There will be no notification if an entry is disqualified for failure to follow any of the above rules.
- 9. Only the winners will be notified prior to the WFOP Spring Conference. The list of winners will be published in the WFOP *Museletter* and posted on wfop.org after the conference.
- 10. Prizes will be awarded only if there are sufficient entries and the judge determines that an entry warrants a prize.
- 11. The first-place winner of the Muse Prize will be ineligible to enter for three years.
- 12. Author retains all rights to his/her work.



The Wisconsin Fellowship of Poets is dedicated to promoting poetry in Wisconsin and seeks to expand its contest offerings by honoring the best chapbooks published in the previous year by Wisconsin residents.

- 3. Chapbooks must be published in 2022. Proof of publication date must be printed in the book.
- 4. Total finished length not to exceed 48 pages.
- 5. Chapbooks may be entered by the author or the publisher, and may be self-published.

- 7. Prizes: First Place—\$200; Second Place—\$100; Third Place—\$50. Prizes will be awarded only if there are sufficient entries and the contest judge determines that an entry warrants a prize.
- 8. The contest is judged by a writing professional who resides outside the state.
- 9. Winners will be notified prior to announcement at the Spring Conference and posted in the Summer *Museletter* and at wfop.org.
- 10. The 1st-place winner of the WFOP Chapbook Prize will be ineligible to enter that contest again for three years.WFOP is not responsible for lost books.
