- 2. Only one original unpublished poem not under consideration elsewhere may be entered in the WFOP Muse contest. "Published" includes any print or electronic presentation except copies of drafts shared with critique groups. Seventy-five line maximum.
- 3. Prizes are: 1st place \$200.00, 2nd \$100.00, 3rd \$75.00.
- 4. Contest opens on November 1, 2023. The deadline is **February 1, 2024**.
- 5. Send the submission in the body of a single email to <u>2024WFOPmusecontest@gmail.com</u>. The subject line should read: "Muse Contest Entry from (Last name, First name)." Attachments will not be opened. The body of your email should include your name, address, email address, phone number, poem title and confirmation of payment of entry fee (see #7, below). Winner's names and poem title will be published in the WFOP Museletter. Please indicate whether you are willing to have your poem published on the WFOP web page if it wins a prize.
- 6. Snail-mail entries will be accepted from people who have no access to email. Deadline for receipt of snail mail submissions is January 25, 2024, because the poems will have to be retyped into the email file going to the judges. PLEASE DO NOT SNAIL MAIL IF YOU HAVE EMAIL! Mailing address: Mary Rowin, 7426 Voss Pkwy, Middleton, WI 53562. Include your name, address, phone number, poem title and whether you are willing to have your poem published on the WFOP website if it wins a prize on a separate page. Include confirmation of payment of entry fee or a check (see #7, below). Do not send a SASE. Entries will not be returned.
- 7. There is an entry fee of \$4.00 for WFOP members and \$8.00 for non-members. The payment may be made at wfop.org/annual-contests. Include confirmation of payment in the email with the poem. Paper checks may be made out to WFOP Literary Fund and mailed to: 2024 WFOP Muse/Rowin, 7426 Voss Pkwy, Middleton, WI 53562. Payment will be matched to submissions. Submissions without payment will not be judged.
- 8. You will receive a return email acknowledging that your poems have arrived. There will be no notification if an entry is disqualified for failure to follow any of the above rules.
- 9. Only the winners will be notified prior to the WFOP Spring Conference. The list of winners will be published in the WFOP *Museletter* and posted on wfop.org after the conference.
- 10. Prizes will be awarded only if there are sufficient entries and the judge determines that an entry warrants a prize.
- 11. The first-place winner of the Muse Prize will be ineligible to enter for three years.
- 12. Author retains all rights to his/her work.

Muse Prize Judge: Janet McAdams, whose new and selected poems, Buffalo in Six Directions/Búfalo en seis direcciones, was published in bilingual editions in Mexico and Argentina. Record-Keeping Tips

by F. J. Bergmann

Once you begin to submit poetry for publication, it's important to keep records of what was sent where, responses received, acceptances or rejections, and, eventually, date and issue of publication. While most journals are fine with simultaneous submissions, you are expected to notify other venues immediately if accepted elsewhere, and also to list where poems first appeared in the event of reprints or book publication.

Some websites, like <u>Duotrope.com</u> (\$) and the Submission Grinder (free) https://thegrinder.diabolicalplots. com/, will track submissions for you and maintain records, but it's wise to also have your own spreadsheet, on your own computer, frequently backed up to a separate drive. Can't afford Microsoft Office? LibreOffice, which is free to download at https://www.libreoffice.org/ will open and save as any MS format, making it useful for submissios as well as records. It can create Excel-compatible spreadsheets, which will let you search and sort records easily.



EDITOR'S NOTE: The Q4 2023 Prompt was an expected challenge. For those that took the weather to heart and head and shared, congrats, successes were made. Some submitters have asked for feedback on their works, happy to give you my take, one-to-one by email or telephone. WFOP has several serious critique groups, many virtual, that give specific input and encouragement for revision. My poems always leave better for the experience.

Some general editorial notes from my perspective, what I am looking for from you. If you would like to discuss, share your thoughts, please reach out to me directly via email; if you would like a call, send me a note at my address below with your telephone number and I will contact you.

Good poems use poetics that help the reader directly experience the story being told through sensory images.

The poem must stand on its own, and once it leaves the creator's desk, telephone or computer, it belongs to us, the readers, and poet intention goes out the window.

There is a difference between stage and page poems. Good think to explore.

Concrete images do more work and connect more directly than abstractions.

Experiment—use your poetic license. Love me some humor.

Please show me, don't tell me what you want me to feel. Many times this is where we end up using abstractions that can take us out of the immediacy of the story being told.

IMPORT—I generally do NOT change anything about your works, so what I see is what you get.

Certainly not an exhaustive listing, but I hope that the above give you some editorial bumpers to use or ignore at your leisure.

Thank you for sharing your unique, thoughtful pieces. I covet them all.
